The reason for this open house is to begin the creation of a Values-based General Plan

Hyde Park is a great place to live. We all recognize the benefits of having a vibrant, active, healthy community. Decisions that we make as a city, such as permitted land uses, trail networks, road alignments, and parking requirements, have a direct impact on the health and safety of our community. However, understanding how current city-planning decisions shape our ability to achieve the community's desired outcomes can be complicated. This can lead to making decisions that seem beneficial in the short-term but that consume valuable community resources and will not help us have the type of community we desire in the long term. A proven way to maintain our wonderful community identity while managing growth is to

1. Identify common-held values, then
2. Build our city in a way that will help us protect and achieve those values.

1. Quality of life (explain what that means to you)
2. Strong neighborhood social networks
3. Culture/nature/atmosphere

6. Community amenities (Parks, trails, tennis and pickleball courts, recreation centers, schools, churches, etc.)

The next step after identifying community-held values is to translate those values into actions. City actions may range anywhere from proactive engagement to help achieving community-held values (through master planning processes, infrastructure planning, development initiatives, construction of community amenities, etc.) to a completely hands-off approach allowing development to be driven by individual property owners. Establishing community expectations regarding the level of engagement that the city should take in leading, supporting, or promoting desired values will help guide efforts and promote understanding as we continue to grow.
